Emergency Preparedness for Homebound and Disaster Situations

In the event of being homebound for a lengthy time or during a disaster situation, it is important for pet owners to be prepared. Here is a list of items to keep handy, easy to carry bag, specifically geared to you pet's needs:

- A pet first aid guide
- 7 days worth of canned food (pop top preferred) or dry food (dry food should be rotated out every two months)
- Disposable litter trays (aluminum roasting pans work well)
- Litter or paper toweling
- Liquid dish soap and disinfectant
- Garbage bags for clean up
- Pet feeding dishes
- Extra harness and leash (harnesses are better than collars)
- Photocopies of medical records
- Contact information for you veterinarian
- Waterproof container of any per medications (rotate these as well)
- 7 days worth of water, specifically for each pet (and each person, too!)
- A carrier for each pet
- Flashlight
- Blanket
- Recent photos of your pet (in case he or she becomes lost)

Note for cats: use scoopable litter in your kit, have a pillow case and some toys available.

Note for dogs: have a tie out, yard stake, and chew toys available.

Remember, if you are preparing for the possibility of pandemic influenza; increase your supplies to 14 days worth.

Stopping the Spread of Germs

From the Centers for Disease Control Fact Sheet

How Germs Spread

Illnesses like the flu (influenza) and colds are caused by viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. The flu and colds usually spread from person to person when an infected person coughs or sneezes.

How to Help Stop the Spread of Germs

Take care to:

- Cover your mouth and nose when you sneeze or cough
- Clean your hands often
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth
- Stay home when you are sick and check with a health care provider when needed
- Practice other good health habits

Cover your mouth and nose when you sneeze or cough

Cough or sneeze into a tissue and then throw it away. Cover your cough or sneeze if you do not have a tissue. Then, clean your hands, and do so every time you cough or sneeze.

Clean your hands often

When available, wash your hands -- with soap and warm water -- then rub your hands vigorously together and scrub all surfaces. Wash for 15-to 20 seconds. It is the soap combined with the scrubbing action that helps dislodge and remove germs. When soap and water are not available, alcohol-based disposable hand wipes or gel sanitizers may be used.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth

Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches their eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs can live for a long time (some can live for 2 hours or more) on surfaces like doorknobs, desks, and tables.

Stay home when you are sick and check with a health care provider when needed

When you are sick or have flu symptoms, stay home, get plenty of rest, and check with a health care provider as needed. Your employer may need a doctor's note for an excused absence. Remember: Keeping your distance from others may protect them from getting sick. Common symptoms of the flu include:

- Fever (usually high)
- Headache
- Extreme tiredness
- Cough sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle aches, and
- Nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea, (much more common among children than adults).

Practice other good health habits

Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food. Practicing healthy habits will help you stay healthy during flu season and all year long.
